

Be the Change



At World Youth Day 2013 held in Rio, Pope Francis had the following message for young people:

'The Lord needs you for His Church', 'Be active members of the Church', 'Go on the offensive... build a better world of justice, of love, of peace, of fraternity, of solidarity'. 'Don't leave it to others', 'Don't be observers of life'. 'Get involved'. 'Be protagonists of change'. 'Do not be afraid to go and bring Christ into every area of life, to the fringes of society' —Pope Francis

Pope Francis' comments are very appropriate because he realizes that the Catholic Church needs to lead the change in order to keep our young people engaged in the Church. The Pope not only is asking the youth to change the world, he is also asking us administrators, faculty and parishioners to change the way we interact and teach the youth.

The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines change as- to become different; to make someone or something different or to become something else. As the Walla Walla Catholic Schools complete its accreditation at Assumption and begins the accreditation process at DeSales, the administration, faculty and school board will be looking at ways to invigorate the school to provide a stronger Catholic Identity and a more innovative method of teaching.

I want to make you aware of some interesting facts that relate to Catholic Schools. In its September 2015 newsletter, Catholic School Management published the following facts: In 1960 4,373,000 students were enrolled in Catholic elementary schools as compared to 1,359,969 today, a decrease of 68.9%. Similarly, enrollment in Catholic high schools declined 34.1%. The average Catholic elementary school tuition is \$3,673 or 68.1% of the cost per pupil and the average Catholic high school freshman tuition is \$9,622 or 81.6% of the cost per pupil. Finally, the graduation rate based on diplomas presented is 99.0% for Catholic Schools and 78.2% for public schools, and the percent attending college is 85.7% from Catholic School compared to 39.5% from public schools.

In closing Pope Francis said "Our generation will show that it can rise to the promise found in each young person when we know how to give them space. This means that we have to create the material and spiritual conditions for their full development; to give them a solid basis on which to build their lives; to guarantee their safety and their education to be everything they can be." May our Lord Jesus Christ bless you and your family and keep you safe.






FISCAL YEAR 2014-2015

WALLA WALLA CATHOLIC SCHOOLS ACADEMIC

- The ELC received a rating of "Quality Level of Excellence" within the Washington Early Achievers Program.

- Assumption Math Team placed first in a city wide math contest.
- SCRIP Program raised \$26,000 for WWCS operating budget.

We all want to leave our mark on the pages of history. We want to be the change in the world. Unless we are on the space station, the only world we can see is the world around us. Be it in Walla Walla, Seattle, Palm Desert or Spokane—small acts can and will change the world.

Even looking at my graduating class at DeSales I can see the world being changed for the better from such a small place. BE THE CHANGE: GENERATIONS THAT CAME BEFORE US HAD CONVICTION

My wife and I have home-schooled our children for 20 years. And yet, there isn't a thing we wouldn't do for Walla Walla Catholic Schools. Our family collectively volunteers hundreds of hours each year to fund-raising activities for WWCS. Why? Because we see worthy Catholic causes as opportunities Our Lord gives us to be generous with our time, talents and treasure. What cause could be more worthy than a school offering a rigorous education while imparting the Catholic Faith to its students and their families?

I graduated from DeSales in 1980 and then from Eastern Washington University in 1984. While at EWU, I met and married a sweet young lady named Kimberly Storment who was earning her degree in home-economics education. We lived in Beaverton, OR, until late 1988, when a job at Key Technology brought us back to the Walla Walla area. By then we had two little boys, Bryan and Kyle, and nine months later Kimberly gave birth to Marcus – our 3rd son in four years.

Our children attended Assumption school and loved it there. When our fourth son, Peter, arrived 10 weeks premature, we found ourselves overwhelmed by the care he required. We realized we had to simplify our lives, and decided to try home-schooling. It has been the perfect educational choice for our family. While it is impossible to duplicate at home the academic rigor provided by a great school system like WWCS, home-schooling has been an excellent way for us to impart the Faith due to the abundance of time afforded each child to be with Mom, with siblings, and available for community service.

I think most people would agree that our culture is in crisis. Kimberly and I strongly believe that vibrant and authentic Catholic education, in all of its forms, is a key to the change that will come only through reclaiming our culture for Christ. We recognize that home-schooling is not the best choice for every family, which is why we are such strong proponents of WWCS. Our belief in the importance of Catholic education has also motivated us to bring Catholic Radio (English and Spanish) to Walla Walla, the Tri-Cities, Hermiston, Clarkston/Lewiston, and, soon, to Bend, Pullman, and Twisp as well.

My folks, Sam and Marie Fazzari, were models of service to the Catholic community for my four brothers and me when growing up. They cooked dozens of dinners for our parish and for WWCS, raising tens of thousands of dollars. They were each blessed with exceptional culinary skills and recognized the Lord's call to serve the local Catholic community by donating their time and talent. Their inspiring example convicted each of their sons to give generously of his time and talent to the local Catholic community.

This year marks the 21st year that the WWCS has operated kitchens at the local Fair, which my family and I have been heavily involved in from day one. We have also cooked many breakfasts and parish dinners over the years, and have made thousands of frozen pizzas, pastas and meatballs for various WWCS fund-raisers that have collectively raised several hundreds of thousands of dollars. Kimberly and I recognize these fund-raising activities as opportunities for our family to do something special together to serve the local Catholic community. Our children love being involved in these activities and eagerly look forward to them. The desire to support WWCS lasts long after they leave home. For example, our oldest son, Bryan, and his family live in Atlanta. A few years ago, the company Bryan works for offered to donate money as a part of their profit sharing to a school of each employee's choice. Without hesitation, Bryan chose ... WWCS.

The theme for this year's annual report is "Be the Change." Our parents' and grandparents' generations lived that theme by creating a Christian culture through the building of churches, hospitals, seminaries and school systems, which they bequeathed to us. In a culture that is crumbling around us, we struggle to simply maintain the structures we've inherited, much less build new ones. Why is that? I believe it is because the generations that came before us were a people of conviction. Ours, on the other hand, seems to be more a people of opinion. And mere opinions don't build grand structures or school systems.

Fortunately, the WWCS system is already built – and what a grand system it is. All we have to do is maintain and improve it so that it can continue to fulfill its role of imparting the Catholic Faith to our young people to equip them for engaging the culture and reclaiming it for Our Lord. This is easily doable for a people of conviction. Like our parents before us, Kimberly and I have done our best to channel to our children the grace God provides us for instilling such conviction. May you also do the same for your family. May God continue to bless in abundance the WWCS and all of the families that are a part of it.

Dear Alumni, Friends and Supporters,

For nearly thirty-eight years the Walla Walla Catholic Schools Endowment Association has been accumulating a permanent fund through wills and bequests, gifts of securities, cash, mutual funds and land, the purpose of which is to provide, in perpetuity, an ongoing and growing source of income to support the operations of the Walla Walla Catholic Schools.

In 1978, its first year, the Endowment provided \$12,707 in income for school operations. During the 2014-15 school year, \$522,811 in support was provided to the schools. Cumulatively, a total of \$5,922,255 has been distributed since the founding of the Endowment Association, with the 2015 distribution being the largest ever.

Today, tuition covers less than half of the cost of a Catholic education so no student or their family pays the full cost of an Assumption or DeSales education. Still, many students need additional financial aid.

Over the years much progress has been made and today the Endowment boasts assets near \$10,000,000, a significant accomplishment. The thirty-seven year story of the Endowment is, however, about a journey, not the destination. We should be proud of what has been accomplished, but we are still aspiring to a goal of providing the Catholic schools all the funding possible and necessary.

With the help of God and many generous donors we may someday reach that goal. In the meantime, we thank the many whose generosity has made all we do possible and ask those who have not yet helped to please consider doing so.


